## ABOUT 1736 FAMILY CRISIS CENTER

1736 Family Crisis Center (1736 FCC) is dedicated to restoring stability and opportunity for people in need. We provide professional support for children, families, and veterans facing challenges such as crime, abuse, homelessness, unemployment, and teen depression and suicide. Our mission is to strengthen safety, promote self-reliance, and help every individual build a secure and successful future.

The organization was founded in 1972 as an outreach effort to shelter young girls and boys who were sleeping on South Bay beaches. Since then, the agency's services have continued to expand in response to area need and to calls received from across the country.

Today, 1736 FCC operates a wide range of programs and services, directly serving more than 10,000 individuals annually, including more than 4,600 children and youth. In addition, the agency provides educational outreach in schools, hospitals, medical clinics, police stations, public events and fairs, and similar settings to promote awareness of crime and abuse and offer linkages to available resources. Each year, we reach more than 25,000 individuals through direct services and educational outreach.

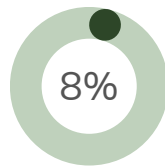

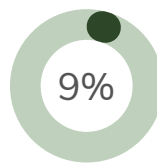

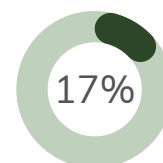

## PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

1736 FCC programs and services operate through 16 facilities and service locations.

- Five 24-hour crisis hotlines professionally staffed to assist callers with crisis intervention, counseling, referrals, and shelter intake;
- Four confidentially-located shelters providing immediate care for crime survivors and their children (ages 0-17);
- A confidentially-located emergency shelter and youth program for homeless and runaway youth (ages 10-17);
- Shelter and supportive services for crime survivors, including permanent housing services and connections to employment services;
- Senior and dependent adult services providing immediate response for needs of older and dependent adults who have experienced abuse. Services, such as counseling, support groups, financial assistance, housing assistance, and connections to local resources are provided;
- A bridge shelter program for unhoused women providing temporary emergency housing, supportive services, and permanent housing placements;
- Youth programming through shelters and educational outreach in schools and other settings, including Elevated Minds, a youth wellness and substance use prevention program, providing crisis intervention, individual and group therapy, peer-to-peer mentoring, and education through the agency's youth advisory board;
- Housing services for individuals and families, including bridge housing, housing navigation, and rapid-rehousing services;
- In-house legal assistance for crime survivors and homeless veterans with court representation, restraining orders, family law services, and other legal needs;
- Veteran Families Program providing homeless veterans and their families with case management, housing search assistance, temporary rental assistance, employment services, and other critical services;
- Four service centers providing outpatient wellness counseling, job development and placement services, benefits application assistance, aftercare, referrals, other supportive services;
- Educational outreach, volunteer and internship programs
